
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CHALKY STRIKES IN FLORENCE PARK?

Cowley Scrubbers

Back in March, at the start of the COVID-19 lockdown, Janie Hampton of Temple Cowley decided to make a few scrubs; loose fitting cotton top and

trousers, worn by doctors and nurses to reduce the spread of infections. She made a set of scrubs for her local GP out of a 1980s flower curtain. The GP's colleagues asked for scrubs too. Soon, Janie ran out of old curtains and so sent a GoFundMe fundraising account to friends and neighbours. "Within days, I could buy enough fabric to make hundreds of scrubs," said Janie. "But I couldn't make them on my own. All of a sudden, over 70 volunteers from around Cowley appeared, and were soon sewing 2 kilometres of fabric. Some couldn't sew, but they could cut out, or deliver. One brought cake; another sent freshly ground coffee to keep me awake. I have never met so many new people in such a short time!

The Cowley Scrubbers have made 500 scrubs for care homes, GPs, a prison, community nurses and occupational therapists. One local care home wrote: "A great big thank you for the scrubs. They are fabulous. You gave the staff a real lift when they needed it. They love the brightness and they are so comfy to work in."

All of them lovely. And all at a dis-

tance."

Cowley Parking

If you see a vehicle parked causing an obstruction, or in breach of a parking restriction, Oxford County Council will deploy their contractor, NSA, to enforce parking. You can contact them on 0345 337 1138, option 3.

On receipt of your report, a civil enforcement officer will be dispatched to the area to assess the situation, and if a vehicle is observed parked in breach of a parking restriction a penalty charge notice will be issued.

If you see a vehicle parked causing an obstruction, but not parked in breach of a restriction, you will need to report this to Thames Valley Police on their non-emergency phone number, 101.

Mask Crusader: Sheila Tree



Like most community centres we were instructed to close our doors on the 22nd March due to the pandemic.

This was a shocking blow, wiping out all the wonderful classes, meetings, bookings and social events we had in our diary - the culmination of the hard work of the previous 6 years was finally bearing fruit.....and then it was all snatched away.

But we were not alone in this, looking around we could see other members of our community, venues, groups, individuals all reeling from the shock of the new status quo.

We are proud of our response to this crisis and of being able to find a way to continue to help, engage and connect with our members, groups and the community.

The Over 60s Lunch Club has been keeping in touch with all its members via weekly phone calls, and swiftly transformed itself

into a Covid-aware meal delivery service for about 20 people. We have also incorporated a newsletter to keep these folks in touch. We recently learned that we were successful in bids to Oxfordshire Community Foundation and SSE for grants to continue this service until October.

We have capacity to cook and deliver more meals on a Friday, so are expanding this service to others in need that are referred to us via the Oxford Hub Street Champions and other community contacts.

We have remained engaged with our Affiliate groups – the book club and others engaged on social media join in a weekly literary project.

We have one of our younger volunteers (aged 11) doing a weekly kids' cookery class on social media: often gaining 150-200 views.

And we have also instigated a joint project with the local primary school and the Isis Care Home to form a 'Friendship Bridge' to get those in the community in contact with the residents of the Care Home.

We are proud of the way we have adjusted to this new state of working for and responding to our community and its changed needs.

Bike week this year will be virtual. Sadly none of the usual events in Oxford will be taking place. But lockdown has highlighted the importance of cycling for our communities.

Bikes for keyworkers. Cyclox has been working with Active Oxfordshire to set up a scheme to give free bikes to keyworkers. So far we have had donations of 190 bikes, 60 of which have already been refurbished and handed to keyworkers, and £9,000 donated. But demand is huge, so please help by donating bikes and money.

Life after lockdown. During these troubled times one very heartwarming sight has been families dusting down bikes and getting out on the road for their daily exercise because they feel safe in our quiet streets. We are anxious to see that Oxford doesn't return to the levels of congestion and air pollution we had before lockdown. We are campaigning for more pop-up cycle lanes and wider pavements, more cycle parking, Park and Pedal as people won't be able to Park and Ride, and early implementation of the city centre bus gates proposed in Connecting Oxford.

Have you noticed the climate changing and fewer birds and insects than before? LEAF is a friendly group doing our bit to change that. We welcome you - from Flo Park, Cowley or surrounding areas - to join us.

"I joined LEAF because it is local and is really doing practical work to make people aware of what they could do to support wildlife and the environment."

"I feel I can make a difference."

We want the recovery after 'lock-down' to be better for people, climate and wildlife. We've planted flower beds for wildlife, installed swift boxes, publicised how to help hedgehogs etc.

The technology to reduce climate change already exists, and changes are already happening, like the rise of renewable energy. We help people learn ways to keep their homes warm in winter, cool in summer and have cheaper bills. At our 'climate cafe' people shared feelings about climate change. We held the first of a series of 'Act Now' workshops on Home Energy. During 'lock-down', other workshops are on Zoom. The next one is Food. Oxford City Council have introduced 5 types of electric car charging points. In phase 2, plans are underway to introduce 100 additional points installed across the city for residents without off-street charging. A message From Oxford Direct Services

If there's an individual in your household with suspected or confirmed Covid-19 in self-isolation, they need to store their waste (e.g. used tissues, disposable cleaning cloths, etc.) following these steps:



Double bag all waste

Sort separately from other waste for 72 hours

After 72 hours, dispose in the green rubbish bin with the lid closed

Frontline staff are working hard to maintain services. Help keep them safe by:

Washing your hands regularly

Keeping a 2 metre distance at all times

Clean bin handles/lids after touching

Disposing of all used PPE such as face masks and gloves in the rubbish bin

Garden waste collections have resumed. In order to run this service more effectively, collection weeks have been reversed. Garden waste bins and brown eco sacks now need to be put out for collection on your green bin or lilac sack collection day permanently.

Bulky waste collections have restarted. We're expecting a longer waiting time than usual as we get the service back up and running. To begin with, we're asking residents to only use the service if it's essential - www.oxford.gov.uk/recycling

Oxfordshire County Council have reopened recycling centres for essential visits and social distancing will be in place to keep everyone safe. Take a look at their website for new site rules www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/wastereopenquestions
